

The May meeting will be a build session with a business meeting, Show- and-Tell, and a raffle.



Patriot Chapter welcomes our newest member, Harry Vig, who brought this neat HO scale railroad yard office to the April meeting. Harry built it OOB and painted it with Createx Airbrush Paints. He weathered it with Bragdon weathering powders. Decals for the signs on the building came with the kit; the Boston & Maine logo is from Microscale. Harry adds, "The Revell tooling was later bought by Con-Cor, which specializes in model railroad items. This was my first heavily weathered plastic kit, done to represent an out-of-revenue service boxcar turned into a yard office."

Show and Tell Gallery

Bill Michaels' 1/48 scale Nieuport 17. Bill added Eduard seatbelts to the Weekend Edition kit and painted it with Polly Scale acrylics. He used pastels for weathering. Markings are for an unknown Russian unit in 1927. Bill also points out this this one is eligible as a "cross-dresser."





Tony D'Anjou's 1/72 scale Curtiss C-46 Commando, built OOB and painted with Model Master enamels. The decals are part kit, part SuperScale. Tony adds, "Since the landing gear doors didn't have attachment points, I fabricated some wire to attach the doors to, drilled holes in the gear housing, and glued them in place. I used Micro Krystal Klear to do the cabin windows."

Pip Moss's 1/48 scale Bf 109E-4 trop in the markings of the well known plane flown by Franz Elles of 2./JG27 in Libya, 1941. The kit cockpit was replaced by a True Details resin set. The undersurface light blue is Aeromaster enamel RLM 65; the tan is a 1-to-1 mix of Model Master enamel British Mid Stone and Italian Tan; the green is a 1-to-1 mix of Model Master enamel Italian Green and Floquil Military Colors RLM 80. The "8" and the rudder victory marks were home designed and printed on an inkjet and a laser printer. The other markings are Aeromaster.



Tell us about your dream modeling project.

Well, my dream is to have enough time, money and space to be able to build what I already have in my stash. It remains a dream at the moment. If they were all done, my fantasy project would be building the Revell 1/144 Shuttle Launch Tower, with complete shuttle stack.
