In Is The next Patriot Chapter meeting will take place on Friday, October 4, at 7:30 p.m. at the First Parish Unitarian Church in Billerica, MA. The church is located on Concord Road, just as it meets Route 3A (Boston Road) at the Billerica Town Common. The October meeting will be a build session with a business meeting, Show-and-Tell, and a raffle.



This is Tom's first appearance on the cover – better late than never! Tom brought three models to the September meeting including this eye-catching Bf 109 G-6 from Border Models in desert markings for JG 27. Tom added an Eduard instruments set and used Guterman smoke nylon thread for the antenna wire. Paints and weathering agents are AK Real Colors, Vallejo Model Air, Vallejo Metal Color, Mr. Color, Vallejo Model Wash, and Tamiya Panel Line Accent. The figure was painted with various acrylics, oils, and MIG pigments. Decals are from the kit and a Lifelike set. Markings are appropriate for Operation Crusader, North Africa, late fall 1941. Tom writes, "The model was Inspired by a few lines in the book "Brazen Chariots" by Major Robert Crisp where a German fighter plane flying at 50 feet "snuck up" behind a British "Honey" tank [see Page 8] giving two crew members only enough time to drop into the tank before the bullets hit the top of the turret. I chose 1:35 scale for this model so it would match the scale of the Honey kit. I know that the 109G was not around during Operation Crusader, but it was the closest I could come to the right model given that I wanted to build a 1:35 scale kit."

Now THAT was an INCREDIBLE EXPO !!!

As the chapter president, of course I'm going to say that Patcon 2024 was a great event, one of the best; but let's be clear: this year really was something special ... like, absolutely freakin' spectacular special.

We had 400 people attend of which 117 competed in the model contest. There were 497 entries on the competition tables, and nearly every category was packed, the largest being aircraft, but significant growth was seen in Ships, Space Vehicles/Gundam, Wargaming and Juniors. 19 children snapped together models at the Kid's Makeand-Take table. I'm a numbers geek so comparing data to earlier shows, attendance and models in competition were up 20–25% over 2022 and 2023, our best previous events, and the Make-and-Take kid count more than tripled. That, my friends, is success.

I think it's safe to say that our new venue was a major draw and a key reason for that success. The American Heritage Museum proved to be the perfect venue for Patcon, not only for the hangar's awesome historical aircraft surrounding the models, but also the museum itself (something cool for people to do during "downtime"). The huge amount of floor space allowed for so many more display tables and the spreading out of the vendor, raffle, and seminar areas. All feedback we've heard to date is we have a winner. I think we have a new permanent show home. Let me take a quick moment here

to thank Ryan Keough and all the folks at the Museum for a great experience and their very gracious contributions to the raffle.

Vendors are always a big attraction for the show, and we had a solid and diverse group this year, both the usual great stalwarts and some cool new faces. Gunpla 101's Doug Wilder and SpruesNBrews' Hank Gilbert each drew sizable crowds to their informative seminars (one of my few show regrets was missing these fine gents' presentations as I have mad respect for each). Lastly, the display-only area was a big hit, and packed! Talking with many attendees, they appreciated the opportunity to show off what they've worked on without the competitive pressure. By the way, the 497 models in competition did not include those that were display-only.

Was the event perfect? Unfortunately no. The food truck was a no-show, judging went long, and those plastic chairs ... all of which the Patcon committee and E-board have met to discuss. Next year we'll be better prepared now that we have this one at a new venue under our belt. But honestly, what little downside there was was so inconsequential compared to all the phenomenal upside. So let's continue to bask in the glow of Patcon 2024, of hanging out with friends, seeing great models, and experiencing a terrific location. As I said earlier, absolutely freakin' spectacular.


Richard Price 1:144 Boeing XB-70 Valkyrie (Armory)

Richard built the model OOB and painted it with Alclad White Primer, Vallejo White acrylic, and Vallejo Steel, Aluminum and Burnt Iron Metal Colors. Decals are from the kit. The model depicts the aircraft as it looked at the time of its first test flight. Richard writes, "A short run kit from Eastern Europe. Took some work to bring together, but a nice end result. The tire sidewalls are meant to be silver as the tires were laced with aluminum for heat resistance."

Designed in the late 1950s by North American Aviation to replace the B-52 Stratofortress and B-58 Hustler, the six-engined, delta-winged Valkyrie was planned as a nuclear-armed, deeppenetration, supersonic strategic bomber that could cruise for thousands of miles at Mach 3+ while flying at 70,000 feet. At these speeds, it



was expected that the B-70 would be practically immune to interceptor aircraft, the only effective weapon against bomber aircraft at the time. The introduction of the first Soviet surface-to-air missiles in the late 1950s put the near-invulnerability of the B-70 in doubt. In response, the Air Force began flying its missions at low level, where the missile radar's line of sight was limited by terrain. In this low-level penetration role, the B-70 offered little additional performance over the B-52 it was meant to replace, while being far more expensive with shorter range. Alternative missions were proposed, but these were of limited scope. With the advent of intercontinental ballistic missiles during the late 1950s, crewed nuclear bombers were increasingly seen as obsolete. The USAF eventually gave up fighting for its production, and the B-70 program was cancelled in 1961.

Bart Navarro: 1:25 1965 Chevelle SS 396 Z-16 (Revell)

Bart built the model OOB and painted it with Tamiya acrylics and MCW enamels.

The first generation Chevelle (1964 to 1967) was upgraded with more power in 1965. It was the first time the Chevy "Big Block" was put into this mid-size car. Known as the Z-16, it was a very limited edition with only 201 produced. In addition to its 396 cubic inch engine, the Z-16 package incorporated a number of additional upgrades. The frame was strengthened with box sections from the convertible, bigger brakes from the Impala, and a heavy duty suspension. In 1965 magazine road tests the Z-16 went zero to 60 mph in 6.7 seconds and cut the quarter mile in 15.3 seconds. The Chevelle SS 396 became a series of its own in 1966.

Tom Flaherty: 1:35 M3 Stuart "Honey" (Airfix)

Tom built the model OOB and painted it with AK Real Colors, AK 3rd Generation Acrylics, Vallejo Model Air and Metal Color, Tamiya Acrylics, and Mr. Color. For weathering he used oils, Tamiya Panel Line Accent, AK varnishes, and various pigments. Decals are from the box, augmented with painted markings masked with home-created stencils cut (for the first time) with a Silhouette Cameo 4. Tom writes, "I tried to get as close as I could to the markings from the tank commanded by Major Robert Crisp in his book "Brazen Chariots" when he was strafed by a German fighter flying at 50 ft during Operation Crusader. This would be, as far as I could determine, the following: 8th Army, XXX Corps, 7th Armored Division, 4th Armored Brigade, 3rd Royal Tank Regiment. The map on the turret top (Duplicata Productions) includes the area where Operation Crusader took place. This kit goes along with the Bf 109." [See Page 1]





Mason Fitch: Diaclone Waruder Suit Aruthic (Nitto)

Mason built the transformer OOB, but added water slide decals and the base and shrubs. Weathering was achieved using Mr. Weathering Black applied with a chipping sponge.





Pip Moss: 1:48 P-38F-1-LO (Tamiya)

The kit was built mostly OOB, but with the addition of an Ultracast resin seat with molded seat belts, and turned brass gun barrels from Master Model. Paints are Mr. Color acrylic lacquers, with various Alclad metallics for the superchargers, landing gear and gear bays. For the top olive drab I used Mr. Color C12 lightly faded with highly thinned mist coats of Mr. Color OD 34087. For the Neutral Gray lower surfaces, I found Mr. Color Dark Gull Grey 36231 an almost perfect match to the chip in Archer's USAAF book (Monogram). The blue for the spinners is Model Master enamel True Blue lightened with a bit of white to match the stripes on the booms. Decals are from an excellent Fundekals sheet, with the kit decals used only for stencils. Markings are for a plane flown by Capt. Robert Faurot, 39th FS, 34th FG, Port Moresby, New Guinea, February 1943.

Tamiya continues to outdo itself with each new kit the company releases. This one is absolutely superb in nearly every respect. Although it is a complex build with a fair number of small parts that could even be described as "fiddly," its ingenious and exacting engineering makes basic alignment foolproof and attachment of items like landing gear doors positive and strong, while minimizing the number of seams to be filled. I have already purchased their follow-up P-38J and look forward to building it as well.





Tom Flaherty: Diecast 1:24 AC Cobra (Welly?)

Tom built the model OOB with the exception of drilling out the exhausts.

Tom writes, "My friend is building a 1:1 kit replica of an AC Cobra that's an actual driveable car. He wanted this diecast to look like it. I will be hand delivering it to where he lives in Texas, and I'll be able to drive the car. I learned a LOT from this model about getting good smooth finishes. I put in all those hours because he and his wife have been wonderful friends through the years.

"The car came with a completely different paint job which had to be stripped before I repainted it in the desired color scheme. The chrome plating was also stripped off for most of the other parts (not the wheel hubs or rim around windshield). It was then painted with Mr. Metal Primer. After that it was painted with Tamiya LP-1 to get a good solid gloss black base. It was then painted with Alclad Chrome. Then it was painted with several coats of SMS Auto Candy Apple Red. Then it was clear coated with Mr. Color. Some of the stripped chrome parts were painted with Alclad Chrome. Others were colored using Molotow Chrome pens. Stripes were either Tamiya LP-1 or LP-2 (if I recall correctly). Engine and perhaps some other parts were painted with Vallejo Metal Colors."





Chris Kizik: 1:48 M10 Wolverine Diorama (Tamiya)

Chris added stowage, US figures, sandbags and barricades from Tamiya, and a resin German soldier from an unknown manufacturer. The M10 and the figures were painted with Vallejo acrylics; for the diorama base Chris used a mix of Vallejo browns and greens with dio mud, dirt, rocks, shrubbery and AK puddles. The diorama depicts the M10 in the Normandy Campaign advancing toward the German line.

Editor's note: I apologize for the lack of other angles in the photos. Chris had to take the diorama back for Show-and-Tell while I was shooting it, and with the large number of models still to be photographed, I never got back to it.



Shivam Midha: 1:144 MD-0032D Guel's Dilzana (Bandai)

Shivam built the mobile suit OOB and hand painted it with Vallejo Mecha Colors. Shivam reports that it was his first attempt using paint.

Among the basic MS Dilanza units developed by Jeturk Heavy Machinery, a number have been customized for their pilots. One of these has been modified to suit the piloting style of Guel Jeturk, heir to the company. Its outward appearance has also been tailored to fit Guel's penchant for the ostentatious. Painted in a vivid magenta and fitted with a decorative headpiece, this unit embodies the skill and unshakable self-confidence that made Guel Asticassia's best pilot. Introduced in *Mobile Suit Gundam the Witch from Mercury*, the MS showed high performance in an initial duel against an unknown student pilot, but it was quickly defeated by the Gundam Aerial's GUND-BITs, and Guel soon transitioned to the Darilbalde. The suit was later repaired and once again piloted by Guel after the Darilbalde was destroyed in the fight with Shaddiq. The feathered headpiece was omitted and the school limiters were removed due to the suit being deployed for actual combat.






Bart Navarro: 1:72 MiG-23 ML (Italeri)

Bart built the kit OOB and painted it with Tamiya acrylics and Mr. Color acrylic lacquers. Decals are from the kit; markings are for the 33rd Fighter Aviation Regiment, 125th Fighter-Bomber Division, 1984.

The MiG-23 "Flogger" is a variable-geometry fighter aircraft designed by the Mikoyan-Gurevich design bureau in the Soviet Union. It is a third-generation jet fighter, alongside similar Soviet aircraft such as the Su-17. It was the first Soviet fighter to field a look-down/shoot-down radar, and one of the first to be armed with beyond-visual-range missiles. Production started in 1969 and reached large numbers with over 5,000 aircraft built, making it the most produced variable-sweep wing aircraft in history. The MiG-23 remains in limited service with some export customers.

The MiG-23 ML "Flogger-G" represents a considerable redesign of the original series with lighter weight, strengthened airframe, new engine, revised landing gear, and improved avionics.





Eric Xu: 1:700 JS Maya (Pit Road)

Eric built the model OOB and painted it with Vallejo acrylics.

JS Maya (DDG-179) is the lead ship of her class of guided missile destroyer in the Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF). She was named after Mount Maya and shares her name with a World War II heavy cruiser. She was laid down by Japan Marine United in Yokohama on April 14, 2017, and was launched on July 30, 2018. She was commissioned on March 19, 2020. Her home port is Yokosuka in Kanagawa Prefecture, Japan. On 16 November 2022, the guided-missile destroyer Maya fired an SM-3 Block IIA missile, successfully intercepting the target outside the atmosphere in the first launch of an SM-3 from a Japanese warship.



John Walker 54mm Private 60th Regiment of Foot (Imrie-Risley)

John added a musket sling and replaced the right hand with one from the spares box. Paints are Vallejo acrylics. The figure depicts a foot soldier serving at the Battle of Carillon.

The Battle of Carillon, also known as the 1758 Battle of Ticonderoga,[4] was fought on July 8, 1758, during the French and Indian War (which was part of the global Seven Years' War). It was fought near Fort Carillon (now known as Fort Ticonderoga) on the shore of Lake Champlain in the frontier area between the British colony of New York and the French colony of New France.

In the battle, which took place primarily on a rise about one km from the fort itself, a French army of about 3,600 men under General Marquis de Montcalm and the Chevalier de Levis defeated a numerically superior force of British troops under General James Abercrombie, which frontally assaulted an entrenched French position without using field artillery, a lack that left the British and their allies vulnerable and allowed the French to win a complete victory. The battle was the bloodiest of the American theater of the war, with over 3,000 casualties suffered.

Bart Navarro: 1:72 Messerschmitt Me 210 A-1 (Italeri)

Bart built the model OOB and painted it with Mr. Color acrylic lacquers. Decals are from the kit; markings are for 8./ZG 1 Wespen.

First flown in September 1939 and intended as the successor to the Messerschmitt Bf 110, the Messerschmitt Me 210 heavy fighter was an inherently unstable aircraft which pilots found nearly impossible to handle. Despite substantial modification of its tail unit, this instability persisted, and production of the type was suspended in April 1942 while renewed efforts were made to improve its flight characteristics. Most of the issues were resolved in the substantially redesigned Me 410, which didn't reach service until 1943, by which time the heavy fighter role was no longer a Luftwaffe priority. All in all, the Me 210 debacle represented a serious embarrassment for the RLM and a corporate catastrophe that nearly bankrupted Messerschmitt.





Eric Xu: 1:700 USS Boxer LPH-4 (Dragon)

Eric built the kit OOB, but added Modelkasten 0.06mm wire for rigging. The ship was painted with Vallejo paints and rust effects; the helicopters were painted with MGG Dark Green.

USS Boxer (CV/CVA/CVS-21, LPH-4) was one of 24 Essex-class aircraft carriers of the United States Navy, and the fifth ship to be named for HMS Boxer. She was launched on 14 December, 1944 and christened by the daughter of a US Senator from Louisiana.

Commissioned too late to see any combat in World War II, Boxer spent much of her career in the Pacific Ocean seeing ten tours in the western Pacific. Her initial duties involved mostly training and exercises, including launching the first carrier-based jet aircraft. At the outbreak of the Korean War, she was used as an aircraft transport before arriving off Korean waters as the third U.S. carrier to join the force. After the Korean War, Boxer saw a variety of duties, including as an anti-submarine warfare carrier and an amphibious assault platform. In her later years, she served as a pickup ship for spacecraft during the Apollo program as well as an aircraft transport to troops during the Vietnam War.

Although she was extensively modified internally as part of her conversion to a Landing Platform Helicopter (LPH), external modifications were minor, so throughout her career Boxer retained the classic appearance of a World War II Essex-class ship. She was decommissioned on 1 December 1969 after 25 years of service.

Patcon 2024 Winners

Patcon 2024 was our biggest show ever, with 117 contestants and 497 entries. Adding in the nearly 100 models on the display-only table and the nine collections entries, each with at least three items, there were well over 600 models in the hangar.

The largest genre was Aircraft with 107 entries. Single-engine prop 1:48 was the largest single category in the contest with 26 entries. Military vehicles totaled 96 entries, Automotive 59, ships 34, Space/Sci-fi/Gundam 73, of which 42 were Gundam, Wargaming 35, Figures 18, Dioramas/Vignettes 27. There were no fewer than 26 Junior entries, a huge improvement over the one entry last year. And now the winners!
